## The Great Supermarket Scandal.

### Do retailers give *any* consideration to disabled customers?



Back in 2011 the then Transport Minister, Norman Baker, urged major retail chains to take tougher action against disabled bay misusers.

"Many disabled people and disability groups have told me about the problems they have in finding a disabled bay at supermarkets because of their abuse by people who have no justification for parking in reserved spaces," Mr Baker said at the time. His appeal for tougher action was "backed" by Aldi, M & S, Morrisons, Sainsbury's, Tesco, Waitrose and Lidl. They said that able-bodied motorists using the bays will be issued parking charge notices - the private equivalent of a parking ticket.

This is what Mark Gunter, Morrisons' group retail director promised. "We will penalise those able-bodied drivers that incorrectly park in spaces allocated for blue-badge drivers." How did that pan out Mark?

5 years later and the misuse of disabled bays in Morrisons car parks is still rife with one Disability Forum regular counting eight cars without Blue Badges on a recent trip to the Stamford branch.

The Forum contacted Morrisons for a response, this from Customer Services. "I can confirm that we are unable to constantly police the situation. Please don't let this put you off shopping, we are listening to our customers and your feedback is very valuable to us." How?

There are 2.5 million blue badge holders in Britain. While local authorities can issue fines to motorists who illegally use disabled bays on the public highway, they are powerless to act on private land.

Jason Merrill, Disability Forum member said "Supermarkets should work with groups like the Disability Forum to come to a proper solution to this continuing problem. My view is that penalties need to be severe because the kind of person who would park in a disabled bay would laugh off a small fine. Retailers need to get their act together once and for all!"

## Is accessible and affordable transport the answer to reducing social isolation?

When we first contacted you about activities he could get involved in, dad was a bit reluctant. He was concerned about using buses, but you introduced him to a chap who would take him out and about. This year has flown by and our dad is unrecognisable from 12 months ago, he's never home! He is out and about taking part in all manner of things, it's brilliant. Again, thank you to you and your colleagues, keep up the good work."

## Number of people caught abusing Blue Badge scheme has soared by 198 per cent



Thefts of blue badges used by disabled drivers have trebled in just three years as motorists try to scam free parking, new figures have revealed.

The latest data from councils showed there were 2,056 thefts in 2015, compared to just 656 in 2013.

The number of people caught abusing the scheme has soared by 198 per cent in 5- from 330 successful prosecutions in 2010 to 985 last year.

Blue badges entitle around 2.5million disabled drivers to free parking in pay and display bays and allow them to park in specially-designated zones. Thieves steal the badges – issued by councils – to sell them on the black market where they can fetch as much as £1,500 each or use them to get free parking

Fraudsters have increasingly been prosecuted by councils in the past year for using stolen or lost badges and using dead relative's badges in order to get free parking when shopping or at work.

In one case last year, Hayley Noyce, of Littlehampton, West Sussex, was hit with fines totalling £1,110 after being caught stealing her elderly grandmother's disability permit while she was asleep at a care home.

Councillor Martin Tett, the LGA's transport spokesman, said: 'The theft of blue badges is clearly a crime on the rise and it is alarming that incidents have trebled in just three years.

Illegally using a blue badge is not a victimless crime. For disabled people, blue badges are a vital lifeline that helps them get out and about to visit shops or family and friends.

'Callous thieves and unscrupulous fraudsters using them illegally are robbing disabled people of this independence.'

A blue badge can only be used in a vehicle when it is being driven or used to transport the holder. Misuse can lead to a fine of up to £1,000.

Is community ownership of the Hand and Heart becoming a reality? The Hand & Heart Community Pub Limited has applied to the Financial Conduct Authority to become a Community Benefit Society.

The goal is to attract £265,000 funding through a community share offer with any interested individual or group able to invest in 10 to 200 shares at £100 each. If successful the CBS will buy the pub, undertake some improvement works and install a manager. Proposed works include: New disabled access and toilet · A parcel drop-off facility for residents who are not at home · Re-introduce pub sport teams – dominoes and crib · Introduce regular coffee mornings · Themed events to encourage take up from residents including Polish nights etc. Pledges so far have reached £100k, but more needs to be raised before September or risk losing the last pub in Millfield to developers. ## Care & Repair wins national award.



The outstanding work carried out by Care and Repair has been commended at the Home Improvement Agency and Handyperson Service Awards 2016. The team was awarded the National Foundations Collaboration Award. Each year the team helps 4,000 people through the handy person service, 1,300 with minor aids and adaptations, and 500 through the larger jobs scheme. Work includes repairs such as damp proofing and roof work, minor adaptations such as rails and banisters, larger disabled adaptation, for example stair lifts and level access showers (wet rooms), and small extensions for wheelchair accessible bedrooms and bathrooms. Disabled people are four times more likely to be victims of crime than non-disabled people – and there is evidence that many more incidents of violence or hostility go unreported or are not dealt with properly by many local authorities, crime prevention units, public transport and other public bodies in Britain.

People with learning disabilities and mental health conditions are particularly at risk and suffer higher levels of victimisation.

A disability hate crime is any criminal offence that is motivated by hostility or prejudice based upon the victim's disability or perceived disability. It can take many forms:

- Physical attacks such as assault, damage to property, offensive graffiti and arson
- Threat of attack including offensive letters, abusive or obscene telephone calls, intimidation and unfounded, malicious complaints
- Verbal abuse, insults or harassment - taunting, offensive leaflets and posters, abusive gestures, dumping of rubbish outside homes or through letterboxes, and bullying at school or in the workplace.
